Why We Love

GREEN Islands

Year after year, the islands that readers elect as most scenic have one thing in common: They're green. Kauai earned a 97.7 score for scenery, and it cannot be a coincidence that Mount Waialeale gets an average of 1.25 inches of rain per day (that'll turn anything green). Legendary for South Pacific pulchritude, Bora Bora (97.5) has an impenetrable green interior. Maine's Mount Desert Island (96.4) is mostly preserved as Acadia National Park. Vancouver Island (94.7) is gorgeous from every angle, with a 290-mile coastline, a rain forest interior—and palm trees, the poster girls of island greenery, growing right around latitude 50 degrees north. Scores in the 90s for scenery occur in just about every body of water, including the Great Lakes, where you'll find Mackinac Island. In Europe, there's Capri in the Tyrrhenian Sea, Mykonos and Bozcaada in the Aegean and Hvar in the Adriatic. In the Atlantic, Madeira and Cape Breton Island. In the Indian Ocean, the Sey-

Atlantic, Madeira and Cape Breton Island. In the Indian Ocean, the Chelles, the Maldives, and Bali. In the Caribbean, St. John. And of course there's more in the pulchritudinous Pacific: Easter Island, the Galápagos, and most remote of all, Alaska's 300 Aleutians. EXPLORING The standout is the Galápagos, the only archipelago in the world to score above 90.0 for activities. But the allure of rare species like the blue-footed booby and giant

tortoises signals a wider interest in communing with ani-

mals living on (or near) islands-elephant trekking in

Phuket, bear and elk sighting in Vancouver, even glimpsing devils in Tasmania. But for truly grand exploration, nothing beats an island that feels as big as a continent. On a clear day atop snow- and observatory-capped Mauna Kea, you can barely see the ocean that surrounds Hawaii's 4,000-square-mile Big Island, where gor-

geous environments range from the lush Waipio Valley to the golf greens of the Kona Coast to the pioneer plants of Volcanoes National

Park. Giant green islands (which do not include Greenland) range from New Guinea to Newfoundland, while The Lord of the Rings exposed the exceptional beauty of New Zealand, particularly the rain forests, fjords, lakes, and glaciers of the South Island. PLAYING Golf. Tennis. Spa. Biking. River canoeing. Fishing. South Carolina's Kiawah Island, the top-scoring isle off North America, has it all at The Sanctuary resort. So does Hilton Head, and more hotels, too, including a Marriott, a Westin, and a Disney. The islands of the Atlantic and the Caribbean seem to specialize in sport: Bermuda's new Tucker's Point Golf Club is earning raves, and inclusion in our Hot List (May 2010). Sailors lured to Tortola charter boats to explore the 60 islands and cays of the British Virgin Islands and the close-by U.S. Virgin Islands, including St. John, more than half of which is a forested national park.
